On Easter Sunday of 2018, 12 seniors at Mercy High School and 3 adult chaperones embarked on a week-long mission trip to Kentucky. I was one of those 12. Mary Poppins

Classic story. Beloved songs. Flying characters. Fantastic magic. Dedicated students. Creative directors. All these elements combined to produce the most successful spring musical in Mercy's history, *Mary Poppins*.

When the creative team of the musical chose *Mary Poppins* for this year's production, they met the challenges head on of this larger-than-life musical. Mrs. Kathy Sill, musical director who oversees all aspects of the show, knew that organization and scheduling were the key

elements to success. "I knew we had to have the musical completely staged a month before the opening so that we could work on all the technical aspects of the show, including flying, in the last month of rehearsal." With every director staying on schedule, the musical was finely tuned by opening night.

One concern of the show was the need for specific costumes for the time period and for flying requirements. Miss Kristen Rockwell, costume designer, and Mrs. Sill worked together to measure and order costumes for specific characters. Even measuring the three characters who take flight during the show had to be very exacting for the harnesses to fit. Over 150 costumes had to be organized and fitted for characters, and then washed or dry cleaned at the end of the show.

Rehearsing on Mondays, Mrs. Rebekah Ferguson, vocal director and conductor of the show, worked with Mr. Chris Holt, accompanist, to teach the cast the songs for the show. Then, Mrs. Ferguson went into technical rehearsals to work with the pit musicians. On the weekend of the show, Mrs. Ferguson took charge of her baton and the all-male musicians in the pit.

For the dancing portion of the show, additional rehearsals were added on Saturdays so that the cast had plenty of time to learn the hand motions for Supercal... and the fancy footwork for Step in Time. Choreographer Krista Eschbach extended her Wednesday dance rehearsals to make sure that the numbers were fine-tuned without the stress of being pressured for time. The cast was eager to learn and run these high-energy numbers.

For the blocking and staging of the musical, Mrs. Sill worked with the cast to set the scenes, develop the characters and stage the song and dance numbers. Since the story takes place in 1910 London, Mrs. Sill brought in Mrs. Suzanne Fanning, who grew up in London and is the mother of Isabelle '20, to work with the major characters on both English and Cockney accents. "I wanted the actors to portray the characters realistically. Mrs. Fanning gave the cast the courage to produce the dialects," Sill said.



The most challenging part of the production was the technical aspect. The script called for a London parlor, a nursery, a kitchen, a bank, a cathedral and a park. Meeting this challenge, Mrs. Anne Sill MacDougall '98, technical director, designed all the set pieces. Mrs. MacDougall, Mr. Ron Sill, assistant technical director, and 17 students built and painted all the set pieces. Working with a three-month time frame, the set was finished and then the real challenge began. Stage crew, dressed as chimney sweeps, and cast members had to move a two-story house that was in three sections on the stage while a scene was being performed downstage. Then, the three sections had to be removed and a two-piece nursery had to be moved on stage with 'precision and order.' "The perfect execution of these scene changes was, without a doubt, the most difficult part of the rehearsal process," Sill said.

Another technical challenge was the magic in the show. With 48 years of technical experience on Mercy shows, Mr. Sill rigged the oven to open and close and the shelves of dishes to slide and then correct themselves on command. Beyond that, making a kite fly on its own was the last problem to be solved and, with 10 days to go before opening night, he mastered that task as well.

The most exciting technical aspect of the show was the flying of three characters. Flying By Foy of Las Vegas was hired to rig the stage for flight. After the rigging arrived, the flight engineer "flew" in and taught Mrs. MacDougall and Mr. Sill how to rig the battens for flight. That evening Kylie Kreucher (Mary Poppins), Matthew Swarthout (Bert) and Emma Pickett (Miss Andrew) learned how to wear a harness and how to fly across the stage. Matthew even learned how to do three somersaults in the air for Step in Time. Without a doubt, the flight scenes were the most exhilarating moments in the entire show.

On the weekend of the show, front-of-the-house coordinator Miss Isabelle Moore '10, Performing Arts teacher, scheduled students to work the box office, tickets, programs, refreshments, sale of shirts and telegrams, and to welcome the large audiences. Overseeing a small but dedicated crew of girls, everyone worked to make sure the audience was their first priority.

The weekend of the show, the audience was transported to 1910 London to relive a classic story about a beloved nanny who saves the Banks family. Not knowing the amount of work that went into the show, attendees saw a well-executed, nearly professional musical. Only the directors and the cast and crews, who met the many challenges head-on, knew that 'anything can happen if you let it.'

PLANNED GIVING CORNER

IRA Charitable Gift Rollover

If you are over the age of 70½, you may be able to make your gift with a distribution from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA), and take advantage of tax savings. Americans over the age of 70½ can distribute up to \$100,000 in a calendar year from an IRA to Mercy High School or other charities, tax-free. This distribution to charity can be a significant benefit for IRA owners who are required each year to take minimum required distributions, which are included in their gross income for income tax purposes.

If an IRA owner directs the IRA plan administrator to distribute any amount up to \$100,000 to charity, the distribution counts toward the owner's minimum required distribution, but is not included in his or her income for income tax purposes.

Although the IRA owner is not entitled to a charitable deduction for the distribution, the distribution benefits charity. This option is known as the "IRA charitable rollover." Your IRA administrator must make the distribution directly to the charity, or you may write an IRA check payable to the charity from your IRA checkbook. If you make a gift to Mercy High School from your IRA, please include written instructions on how you would like to designate your gift.

The rules applicable to Qualified Charitable Distributions from retirement accounts are very specific. Before you decide whether you should make such a gift, you should consult your tax advisor to determine if you qualify and whether such a gift makes sense given your particular situation.

Q & A with Kimberly Morrison Wilber-Mader '77 Research and Development Manager, Abbott Molecular

Q: Have any interesting discoveries been made or products developed under your watch?

A: I had the great fortune to be in the right place at the right time. I started out working in a university lab, and I saw a tiny ad for a positon at Amoco. I took the risk and I took a lab positon as a technologist. People there found a technology called fluorescence in situ hybridization that was being developed at the University of California in San Francisco. In the late 80s and 90s, it was just a research effort, and we were able to develop the technology into a diagnostic/prognostic test, license it, and grow it into standard of care around the world.

Q: How did you get interested in science?
A: I loved it from the time that I can even remember thinking.
I guess I was kind of the classic little girl nerd. For Christmas one year, I asked my parents for a microscope. I got a kick of growing little brine shrimp and looking at onion cells.

Q: What suggestions do you have for our students who aspire to careers as scientists?

A: If you have any interest in it, it's absolutely worth pursuing. There are lots of opportunities. I worked in academia, and now I work for a big company, and there are good things on both sides of the fence. As a young lady in science, you should really believe in yourself, really believe you can do it. When I look back at my career, one of the things that we didn't do very much of, but is so incredibly beneficial, is networking: talking to people that are interested in science, or going to a STEM event to meet other students and adults involved in science.

Q & A with Monisha Berkowski PhD '04

CHIEF PSYCHOLOGIST, BROUGHTON HOSPITAL

Q: Tell us how you made your way into clinical psychology.

A: My interest started in high school. I remember taking Intro to Psychology with

Ms. Rozman and being fascinated by what influences human behavior and connection, and what motivates people to live the lifestyles that they do. In addition, I did have a couple friends throughout my life who had traumatic experiences or were touched by mental illness, so I had a personal connection in wanting to work with people who have these struggles. [My most interesting college course] was Abnormal Psychology, which focused on serious mental disorders. [A mentor] encouraged me to volunteer at a crisis helpline. I found that extremely challenging but also extremely rewarding - how to connect with people and help them out when they're in some of the worst places in their life. So, I majored in psychology and then earned a PhD in clinical psychology to get more rigorous training in research.

Q: What can psychology offer your patients?
A: What I love about psychology and my job is that I get to work with the whole human. It's not just writing a prescription for medication, it's really getting to know people, getting to know about their history, their background. Ninety percent of my patients have some sort of trauma in their history...helping patients work through these difficult life experiences, but also helping them figure out what their goals are and being more future oriented...helping them be connected with services in the community when they get discharged from the hospital.

Q: You were active in sports in high school and college. How do those experiences influence you today?

A: Looking back, it's certainly not the coursework that I have the fondest memories of. It's really building those bonds, having fun, and learning life lessons through sports: Teamwork, camaraderie, learning how to lose and work hard. Sports and other extracurricular activities definitely enrich whatever career or passion that people pursue.



IN MEMORY OF SISTER MARY TIMOTHY BROWN, RSM JUNE 27, 1925-JANUARY 7, 2018



Sister Mary Timothy Brown entered the Sisters of Mercy in 1943 and made her made perpetual vows in 1949. She taught typing, bookkeeping and shorthand at Mercy from 1960 to 1963 and brought television broadcasts to the school. She returned to the high school in 1971 as Associate Principal and Dean of Students, a role she held until 1988. Riding her yellow scooter throughout the halls, Sister Mary Timothy kept watch on students. She ruled with a no-nonsense approach, yet had a ready smile and a twinkle in her eye for every Mercy girl. She was a loyal fan of Marlin sports and Detroit teams. After leaving the school, she became Director of Operations at McAuley Center and was responsible for finance and physical plant maintenance until retiring in 2010. She held a master's degree in business from the University of Detroit.

Sister Mary Timothy was an unassuming, prayerful woman who had great devotion to Mary. A daily Rosary, the motto in her silver ring, "Through Mary to Jesus," and a custom of wearing blue on Saturdays in honor of Mary were all an important part of her life. She had a great sense of humor and enjoyed a good time with the Community. She is fondly remembered by many students and those whose lives she touched.
