STATE OF COLLEGE ADMISSIONS/HOW COLLEGES MAKE DECISIONS

State of College Admissions

Colleges accepting <20% of applicants Colleges accepting 30-40% of applicants Colleges accepting at least half of applicants

State of College Admissions

The Good:

80% of colleges accept more than half their applicants Over half accept more than two-thirds of their applicants

The Bad:

Roughly 40 highly selective schools accept less than 20% of their applicants

Takeaways:

- Create a balanced college list
- Great college experiences happen everywhere

Transcript

The transcript is used to help an admissions office understand how the student arrived at their GPA.

- Courses taken and individual grades earned
- Patterns in course selection (rigor)
- Trend in grades

Colleges want to know how prepared is the student to be successful at their institution. The more selective the college, the more important the strength of the transcript becomes.

STANDARDIZED TESTS

Standardized Testing

Our current reality:

- Impact of Covid-19 on testing as a factor of admission
 Some colleges reported test-optional through 2022
 Colleges that adopted a COVID test optional policy will update websites as we move into the spring.
- Applicants need to visit each college's website to learn about that school's testing requirements - which may change

Which Test is Best - ACT or SAT?

- Based on what we know now, we recommend students plan that they will need to test
 - Some schools may require testing and others may adopt a test-optional policy
- Most students will still perform better on the ACT
- Colleges want the test the student performs best on

When Should a Student Test?

- Begin taking 2nd semester of 11th grade
- Multiple attempts of the ACT and/or SAT may be recommended
- Eligibility for Michigan Competitive Scholarship:
 Demonstrated financial need (FAFSA) & 1200+ on the SAT

Test Registration and Reporting

- Students/Parents register for the tests through test websites (act.org- ACT, collegeboard.org- SAT)
- Always release your scores to Mercy High School (231-005)
- Realize that you may be bombarded with mail after you take a test
- Recommend you do not release scores on test day because of test-optional admissions

Essays

The Essay has job to do:
 Humanize the application
 Hear your student's voice and personality

2. Many colleges don't need an essay

- 3. Some schools have supplemental essays• Why this school, this program, etc.
- 4. Your essays should sound like your student.
- 5. Take the pressure off this piece.



• Activities show commitment to something in your life.

• Should be used to demonstrate what you like to do in your free time.

• College is about academics - the activities show that you will be involved in something outside the classroom.

Choosing the Right Fit School

Is it the right <u>ACADEMIC</u> fit?

- Does it have your programs?
- Will you be challenged academically?
- Opportunities in the classroom? (research, study abroad, etc.)
- Student to teacher ratio
- Class size
- Are most of the classes taught by professors or TAs?
- Will it academically prepare you for a career you want?



Choosing the Right Fit School

Is it the right <u>FINANCIAL</u> fit?


- Do you have the right aid and scholarship package that works for your family
- Are there ways to decrease tuition through opportunities?
- What will it cost year #1 compared to year #4?
- This is an investment, but think about investment vs debt.
- Different tuition programs?



Choosing the Right Fit School

Is it the right <u>SOCIAL</u> fit?

- School Size?
- What % of students live on campus? commute?
- What do students do when they are not in class?
- What do students do on the weekends?
- Does the campus have Greek Life?
- Is there diversity on campus?
- How is the food?
- What clubs are popular?



Campus Visits

- Visits are happening virtually and in-person at "some" schools
- Make it Official
 - Contact the Admission Office/sign-up online
- Do you see yourself as a student?
- Sit in or peek in a class
 - Big, personal, lecture, interactive, technology
 - Would you want to be in that class?
- Residences Halls and Cafeteria
 - Eat lunch, see a couple of rooms
 - Are the facilities outdated?
 - Could you see yourself living and eating here?
- Talk to people outside of Admissions
- A way to show demonstrated interest in a school
- Can't visit in person visit virtually at <u>youvisit.com</u> or SCOIR

Must Know Information

- Student graduation rates
 Retention 1st to 2nd year
 Internship opportunities
 Job Placement
 Graduate School Placement (including Med, Law, etc)
- Programs for undecided students
- Ability to change major
- Average Financial Aid/Merit Package

Students complete College Survey on SCOIR
Parents complete College Survey/Brag Sheet on SCOIR

Future Programming

- Course selection geared toward college list
- Essay writing assistance
- Meetings at student request (as needed)
- Presentation/May 2022 (for rising seniors) to help them organize & prepare for applying
- Presentation/August 2022 (for seniors) application nuts & bolts & the Mercy process
- Individual student check-in meeting in September of senior year
- Senior parent meeting

What you can do...

- Take a deep breath

- This is a marathon not a sprint

Fast Facts

- Average student applies to 6-8 schools
- Most students need one (or no) teacher letters of recommendation
- Most applications open up August 1st
- Look at Honors Colleges at State SchoolsEach student will have their own timeline
